The year seems to have slowed down with the COVID-19 Pandemic lockdown. Having now moved to Alert Level 2 there is a degree of the 'new normal' returning to our lives, however the flow on effects will last for some time to come.

The good news is that St George's Cancer Care remained open and treating patients.

It is hard to believe that the St George's Cancer Care is celebrating its 10th anniversary. Chemotherapy consultations and treatments first commenced in the original Hospital Heritage Building and then relocated to the new facility in February 2010. The first consultant oncologists' consultations commenced on Tuesday 23 February 2010 preparing patients for radiotherapy treatments on Monday 29 March 2010.

Over the past ten years the following figures show how busy the Centre been.

Welcome to Clinical Nurse Team Leader, Tracey King

Tracey joined our team in October 2019. Since starting she has made significant contributions in further developing and educating our nursing team and reviewing our processes in medical oncology to ensure we stay at the forefront of treatments and nursing care.

Tracey and her family made the decision to join her sister in New Zealand and moved to Christchurch in August 2011.




Tracey started in the Oncology Department at Christchurch Hospital in December 2011, whilst there she undertook several roles: Nurse Educator, Cancer Nurse Coordinator and Research Nurse Coordinator. During that time, she continued with her education and completed her Postgraduate Diploma in Nursing Studies, with distinction, from Otago University in 2018.

SABR treatment update

In 2015 St George's Cancer Care embarked on a SABR programme (stereotactic ablative body radiation treatment).

This technique is an advanced form of radiation treatment allowing very accurate delivery of high doses of radiation, given in a few treatments over a few days rather than many treatments over several weeks.



In 2017 the St George's Cancer Institute supported the Centre to acquire additional technology to enable this treatment to

be used in more complex scenarios such as the spine.

The number of patients benefitting from this treatment is increasing every year and will continue to do so, as it is expanded to other treatment sites such as the liver.

Dr Kumar's specialist areas are thoracic oncology, breast cancer and melanoma.

Raj did his undergraduate training at the University of Otago (NZ) graduating with a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery, and Bachelor of Medical Science in 2004. His postgraduate training was done at Wellington Hospital (NZ), becoming a Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians in 2012.



He worked at the Flinders
Medical Centre (AUS) for a 1-year clinical fellowship in
gastrointestinal and thoracic oncology. He then went on to join
the Phase 1 Unit at the Royal Marsden Hospital (UK) for 18
months as a Clinical Research Fellow. Following this, he held
a post in the Lung Cancer Unit at the Royal Marsden Hospital
(UK) as a Clinical Research Fellow where he embarked on an
MD (Res) degree combining immunotherapy and palliative
thoracic radiotherapy. He successfully defended his thesis in
2018. For the first part of 2019, he worked as a Locum
Consultant Medical Oncologist at the Royal Marsden Hospital,
specialising in lung cancer, breast cancer, and acute oncology.
